Course Description

Germany is globally seen as a successful environmental leader because of its renewable energy transition, environmental and climate protection, the nuclear power phase-out in the wake of the Chernobyl disaster, and the rise of the Green Party. The US, on the other hand, has been criticized for its lax environmental regulations, high CO2 emissions and a "culture of waste". Where do the cultural imaginaries of the two countries come from? How valid are they? This class examines the interaction between humans and the natural world in Germany in historical perspective; and it draws select comparisons with developments in the United States. We will study local and regional developments - through excursions and place-based workshops in Munich and Bavaria.

This seminar is part of a new Munich summer program offered by the Amerika-Institut during the summer term. It is open to LMU students and to students from US partner universities. The seminar is organized as a multiple-block seminar.
